DOWNTOWN - 106 S CENTER ST



13TH STREET DISTRICT

Echo - A 34' tall stainless steel sculpture sitting at the center of the 13th Street District. Since installed in 2015, Echo and its surrounding green space creates a grand welcome into the District providing a unique space for community gatherings.

Rotary Mural - This mural has no specific meaning. What do you see?

DOWNTOWN

Postcard Mural - Representing Marshalltown history icons. Fun fact - if you stand across the street you can line up the tip of the actual Court House with the mural.

Perspective - Focuses on using many faces with bright, bold colors to represent our diverse community and to symbolize unity. The hexagon pattern in the background is meant to convey the idea of people being interconnected, and the dotted lines connecting different eye shapes is meant to show the importance of seeing the world from different points of view. The waves in the bottom are meant to represent the lowa river, and they flow from a rainbow of hearts meant to symbolize the inclusivity and welcoming of different cultures. Also, in the bottom corner is a tree to represent the growth and resiliency of our community.

Marshalltown's Starry Night - Local artists painted their Marshalltown version of Van Gogh's Starry Night. Look closely!

Sidewalk Poetry - Iowa poet, Akwi Nji, had conversations with residents who were directly impacted by the tornado. From those conversations, she created 11 poems etched into the concrete throughout the park.

Tremont Mural - This mural has no specific meaning. What do you see?

Scherzo - Consisting of colorful abstract forms based on musical notations such as the bass clef, the forte f and musical notes, plus three kinetic mouth-shaped forms at the top that celebrate the rhythms, sounds and ideas generated within this outstanding performing arts venue. The title "Scherzo" refers to a short orchestral piece of music, especially in the second or third movement of a symphony or sonata.

Drills - An 18' aluminum sculpture of three basketball players (2 male/1 female) sitting at the entrance of the renovated Marshalltown High School Roundhouse. Since installed in 2016, Drills welcomes you to the iconic Roundhouse representing community spirit and pride while exemplifying excellence and innovation. Drills captures the excitement of student life while paying homage to the building's history and architecture.

Marshalltown Safety Murals - Murals were placed at the 11 schools in Marshalltown as a school zone safety initative. In May of 2019, our community tragically lost an 8-year-old, Christian Maxon, after being struck by a car while crossing the street after school. We believe arts provide hope, healing and are a creative way to address community challenges.
